

There is a considerable amount of gear and the majority of the items have been tested to see if they seem to function or not. 

ormally we expect the bands to be intermittently poor when there are lots of sunspots. For example, around solar maximum, CMEs (coronal mass ejections) and solar flares are most prevalent. CMEs can cause geomagnetic storms that elevate the Kindices, which can then deplete the F2 region of electrons (the region most important for our DXing efforts).

Solar flares around solar maximum can cause solar radiation storms that increase absorption in the polar cap (thereby affecting over-the-pole paths) and can cause radio blackouts that can increase absorption on the daylight side of the Earth. But as a solar cycle declines, these disturbances to propagation tend to lessen. Unfortunately, coronal holes then become more prevalent.

In the middle of October we had a run of spotless days - in other words, no sunspots were seen on the Sun. See the "spotless Sun" image from spaceweather. com. Note the text that says we've had 7 consecutive days of zero sunspots as of

15 October 2017. This is to be expected as we near solar minimum between Cycles 24 and 25.


But during this period of spotless days the bands were unexpectedly poor. Normally 20-Meters and 17-Meters, in addition to the lower frequencies, would be productive - but they weren't. What happened?

The problem is we're still some two years away from solar minimum. We're still in Cycle 24's decline. And the declining phase of a solar cycle results in the most geomagnetic disturbances that can screw up the bands.

These geomagnetic disturbances are due to the aforementioned coronal holes, which are areas of open magnetic field lines on the Sun. And just like CMEs, material is ejected from the Sun that eventually can elevate our K indices through an increased solar wind pressure (the pressure is proportional to the density of material ejected times the square of the speed). For the period cited in the "spotless Sun" image, the planetary K indices (Kp) were highly elevated as seen in the "Kp indices" plot from http://www.swpc.noaa.gov/ (scroll down a bit on this page to get to the Kp plot).

With the K indices highly elevated for a long period, it's no wonder that the bands were poor. The good news is that as we get nearer to solar minimum, coronal holes will start lessening, which

> netic field will become quieter. When that happens, the lower bands will be very productive for DXing, and 20-Meters and 17-Meters will offer more consistent daytime worldwide DX opportunities. Of course, the bands higher than 17-Meters will still be quite useless most of the time (but may come to life in the summer due to sporadic E).

I should mention that as of the time I'm writing this (October 17), the geomagnetic field has guieted down and the bands have returned to what we'd expect around solar minimum. The result of this is that many North Americans worked 3CØL on 160-Meters on the evening of the 16th/17th, and I worked VU7T on 20-Meter CW on the 17th. I doubt if this would have been possible if the Kp indices were highly elevated.



"Force of 50" Volunteers' Puerto Rico Hurricane Recovery Mission Ends

The 22 "Force of 50" radio amateurs who deployed to Puerto Rico earlier this month as American Red Cross volunteers have ended their mission and will be back on the US mainland by week's end. They had been in Puerto Rico for about 3 weeks.

"The Force of 50 volunteers demonstrated an extraordinary range of skills possessed by this accomplished team," said ARRL CEO Tom Gallagher, NY2RF. "There was no task that they wouldn't tackle. It also demonstrated the generosity of these volunteers, who not only performed their roles as communicators, but also engaged the population with their many acts of personal kindness."

Val Hotzfeld, NV9L, who filed situation reports documenting the team's activi-

ties, said the volunteers accomplished everything they went to Puerto Rico to do, "and then some." She said that the Red Cross felt they had exceeded all expectations.

"We opened a lot of peoples' eyes when we started going to the ESF-2 communications task force meetings. They had no idea of our capabilities," Hotzfeld told ARRL. "When they heard what we'd accomplished, we were swarmed; everybody was wanting us."

Hotzfeld said the volunteers' initial mission was to provide a way to gather outbound health and welfare messages and put them into the Red Cross's Safe and Well System using Winlink. However, the mission changed once they were on the ground when they discovered the needs were much greater.

"No one had any communications, so the mission morphed to communications," she said. "But, we did both." She said

the Red Cross recognized the value of ensuring communication for hospitals, and other volunteers handled Safe and Well messages.

She said the volunteers possessed a wide range of talents, from medical to mechanical, not just communications. For example, Andy Anderson, KEOAYJ, set up the helicopter landing pad at Guajataca Dam, Hotzfeld said, and provided communications where there was none.

Ten SHARES (Shared Resources) HF Radio Program operators will replace the Amateur Radio volunteers who had worked on behalf of the Red Cross. These SHARES operators are federal employees who happen to be radio amateurs and volunteered for the duty in Puerto Rico. Hotzfeld said they will be stationed in four different zones, with two operators at headquarters in the San Juan Convention Center. "The hospitals did not want us to leave," Hotzfeld said. "They were begging us to stay." She noted, though, that the hospitals also have access to satellite telephones.

"I was so proud of our guys," Hotzfeld said in summary. "They were rock stars."
