RELOCATING THE 146.94 ANTENNA WAS NO SMALL TASK

Just to make it official: the antenna for the FWRC 146.94 repeater has been relocated to a slightly lower position in its home at Parkview Hospital's Randallia campus. Due to the renovation of the Hospital, the antenna tower on top of the main core of the complex was considered too ugly, and the administration wants it to be removed. This meant that any antennas mounted on the tower structure had to be removed. Our 94 antenna was actually the second highest on the tower.

The antenna for the 94 is now on the edge of the main core's roof, at about 120 feet above the ground. While up on the roof last week helping with the take down, it was clear from our view that we have a nice unobstructed view in all directions, so we believe that the range of the repeater will see little degradation. I simple test the other night with a mobile headed to Kendallville showed that coverage to the north was not seriously degraded. The tower itself is still up there, but will be dismantled shortly. (the original plan was to use a Helicopter to take down the tower. This was judged to be unacceptably risky, so it was decided to disassemble the tower in place)

This work was very difficult. We were asked by the tower crew that stripped the tower of its antennas to help out and identify our assets and get the repeater back on the air. We spent almost 8 hours on the roof in the cold and the rain, and were pretty exhausted when it was all done. When finished, we had the

repeater operation restored, frequency was tweaked to about 10 HZ of nominal, and the output tone was changed to the coordinated tone of 97.4 HZ (no input tone required).



STRAIGHT KEY NIGHT: A RETURN TO THE BASICS

ARL Straight Key Night (SKN) returns on January 1, 2015 (0000 to 2359 UTC), offering a chance for many to get back to their Amateur Radio roots. Those operators who began their years in Amateur Radio restricted to CW on the old Novice bands used some sort of manual key to send. Straight Key Night is an opportunity to relive those "brass-pounding" experiences. This 24-hour event is not a contest but a day dedicated to celebrating our CW heritage.

Participants are encouraged to get on the air and simply enjoy conversing in CW, with the use of a straight — or hand — key or bug for sending preferred. Some enhance the fun by using vintage radio gear. No points are scored, and everyone who participates is a winner!





Straight Key Night participants may use all authorized Amateur frequencies, but activity has traditionally been centered on the HF bands.

Call "SKN" instead of "CQ" to solicit contacts, and use SKN instead of RST when transmitting signal reports. These tip off passers-by that you're taking part in Straight Key Night and may lead to additional contacts. When the event is over, you're invited to vote for the operator with the "best fist" or sending style (this does not have to be someone you worked) and for "most interesting QSO." The results will be tabulated and included in the results. Send your information to straightkey@arrl.org.

I'M BORED . . .

When my wife Vicky AE9YL and I flew to Jackson, WY for our 7-day pack trip in the Teton Wilderness area last August (see the September 2014 FWDXA column for more details), our priority for packing

was to make sure we took everything we thought we might need during our weeklong stay away from civilization. As a result, I didn't take any reading material or material to work on as I usually do.

The flight from Fort Wayne to Atlanta was relatively quick. But the flight from Atlanta to Jackson was long – about 4 hours. After a couple hours, I had gone through the Delta magazine twice and the Skymall magazine twice, and had no interest in the audio, video or games offered on the seatback screen.

But the en route map caught my eye. It showed our location along the Atlanta to Jackson route. Included were some basic flight data – our ground speed, our headwind/tailwind, the outside air temperature and our altitude. My first thought was to jot down the speed info so I could calculate and monitor our TAS (true air speed). I expected the TAS to be reduced to less than 250 knots below 10,000 feet as we descended into Jackson (this is a law). I also wrote down the temperature since it was available.

About a half hour before our arrival in Jackson, we began our descent. Our cruise altitude was 40,000 feet, and I tried to take data in 1,000 foot increments as we descended. One of the first things I noticed was a drop in temperature as we started down. I had expected a rise in temperature. The temperature at cruise was -62 degrees F, and the temperature went down to -71 degrees at 37,000 feet. Then it started back up, and it reached

+60 degrees on final approach before the data was shut off, which was just below 7,000 feet (remember Jackson is up there in altitude). See the accompanying plot.


What I inadvertently caught going into Jackson was the tro-

popause. If you're not familiar with the temperature trend in the atmosphere, the temperature in the troposphere drops as you go up in altitude from ground level.

It reverses direction at the tropopause, and then starts going back up in the stratosphere. It again reverses direction at the stratopause, and starts going back down. The lowest temperature in the atmosphere is the mesopause, after which it starts going back up in the mesosphere.

The tropopause is typically around 10 km at the latitude of Jackson, WY, and can vary by a couple km depending on daily variation, season, etc. 10 km is about 33,000 feet, so indeed I saw the tropopause. I also took data on our way back home when we were on the descent into Atlanta, but did not see the tropopause – it must have been a bit higher than our 41,000 foot cruising altitude at the latitude of Atlanta. This data is also plotted on the accompanying plot.

In summary, that kept me busy enough to not get too bored on the latter portion of both flights. I still should have taken more reading material!

LEAGUE'S CENTENNIAL "THE MOST EXTRAORDINARY EVENT" FOR ARRL PRESIDENT

As the ARRL's Centennial drew to a close, ARRL President Kay Craigie, N3KN, reflected that the year-long celebration helped to rejuvenate Amateur Radio by including as many people as possible, providing lots of on-the-air fun, and promoting learning and doing. She also believes that the spirit of the Centennial will live on going forward, as Amateur Radio enters its second century.

"The ARRL Centennial has been the most extraordinary event in my Amateur Radio life," President Craigie remarked. "How fortunate I am to have been a ham in this anniversary year, let alone to have been President of the ARRL."

President Craigie said that Centennial activities, such as the Centennial QSO Party and the W1AW portable operations in all 50 US states and some territories, were aimed at giving members a chance to learn, to feel, and to do, and in the process generating positive feelings about being a part of Amateur Radio and of the ARRL. "We wanted members to have fun participating in activities, both in person — at the national and regional conventions — and on the air," she recounted. "We wanted the events and experiences to be inclusive — something all members could participate in, if they wanted to."

So, every member was given a point value in the Centennial QSO Party. And, recognizing that not everyone could come to the National Centennial Convention in Hartford, the League designated several major ham radio gatherings around the US as regional centennial conventions, so everyone would have an opportunity to participate. Convention forums as well as information and articles in QST and in electronic media provided something every member could learn from and enjoy, she said.

"I recall suggesting that we could move W1AW around the country," she said. I was just thinking about the call areas, but the staff exploded that into every state and several territories."

"Because of the good work done by the ARRL Headquarters staff and a huge number of enthusiastic volunteers all over the country, the Centennial success-



fully achieved those goals beyond what we were able to imagine," President Craigie said. "Thousands of ARRL members chased W1AW and worked each other across the bands and modes, having tremendous fun doing it. In QSOs and on their QSL cards, members told me how much they appreciate what the ARRL does for Amateur Radio."

President Craigie pointed out that not only was the greater Amateur Radio community enjoying itself on the air, but that some people who had been inactive for years got back on to be part of the Centennial. As the most dramatic example, she pointed to an anecdote that Northern Arizona DX Association President Bob Wertz, NF7E, related on the back of his QSL card to her. Wertz reported having worked an operator who had been off the air for 45 years but told him he "just had to get back on for the Centennial QSO Party."

"I was his first QSO after those 45 years," Wertz observed. "We ragchewed, and I welcomed him back!" The Centennial QSO Party was "such a positive event for the League," he told President Craigie.

"I've heard about other people who had been inactive for 20 or 25 years," the League President continued. "I also had contacts with a number of brand-new hams, for whom the Centennial year was 'Year One' in their ham radio lives. For a few of them, I was their first QSO on HF. They got to chase W1AW and to work the

QSO Party as part of their introduction to Amateur Radio. Lucky them!"

President Craigie said she contacted operators who told her they had qualified for WAS because of the Centennial operating events. "I feel good that our operating events had something for experienced operators, newbies, and even people who had lost interest in ham radio," she said.

President Craigie said that as the Centennial year played out, people were stopping by on her frequency just to say how much fun they'd had helping the League to celebrate its 100th anniversary. "One member said he had not been on HF for 20 years, sticking to VHF, but got back on HF for the Centennial. Another member said he thought the events have been a huge shot in the arm for Amateur Radio."

"It really is all about the people and the fun," she observed.

At the end of the year, President Craigie reported, she had logged some 16,000 contacts during 2014, most of them from calling "CQ Centennial."

"For the first time in my life I was the most popular kid in school," she quipped. "I won't forget the rush of that feeling when I'm back to being just another signal from Virginia.

President Craigie said some have been asking what the ARRL will do next. She said that while the League doesn't want to wear out the exuberance and goodwill the Centennial events engendered, "it's clear that operating challenges outside of the traditional menu of contests and awards have a great appeal." She expressed the hope that, in the months and years ahead, all hams will seek out other operating challenges sponsored by all sorts of ham radio groups and keep the bands alive with signals.

"To everybody: Thanks for coming to the birthday party!" she concluded. "Happy New Year!
